ACTIVITIES: Boating Safety Course

Boating Safety Course...This 8-hour course may be offered at MBC in the fall, but we must have some idea of the interest from our membership. It is designed to familiarize the student with the fundamentals of safe boating and qualify for certification in Michigan, a State that requires boating education for anyone born in/after 1996. Subjects include: Boat handling under normal conditions and adverse conditions and emergencies, types of boats and boating terminology, required and recommended equipment, boating regulations and navigation rules, lines and knots, marine radiotelephone usage, and trailer boating. If you think you might be interested, please email cneuhauser@gmail.com and indicate your interest. Non-MBC members are eligible.

Rules for Michigan Boaters:

Persons less than 12 years of age:

May operate a boat powered by a motor of no more than 6 hp legally without restrictions.

May operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 6 hp but no more than 35 hp legally **only if** they:
Have been issued a boating safety certificate and have it on board the boat **and...**

Are directly supervised on board by a person at least 16 years of age.

May not operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 35 hp legally under any conditions.

Those born on or after July 1, 1996, may operate a boat legally only if they have been issued a boating safety certificate and have it on board the boat.

Those born before July 1, 1996, may operate a boat legally without restrictions.

Personal Watercraft

Those **less than 14 years of age** may not legally operate a PWC.

Those **14 and 15 years of age** may operate a PWC legally only if they have obtained a boating safety certificate **and...**

He or she is accompanied on board by his or her parent or legal guardian or by a person at least 21 years of age who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian **or...**

He or she is operating or riding the PWC at a distance of not more than 100 feet from his or her parent or legal guardian or from a person at least 21 years of age who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian.

Those at least 16 years of age and born after December 31,1978, may operate a PWC legally only if they have obtained a boating safety certificate.

Those **born on or before December 31, 1978,** may operate a PWC legally without restrictions.

Enforcement

Michigan law enforcement officers patrol the waterways to make your boating experience safe and pleasant. Cooperate with them by following the laws and guidelines.

Carry the Card: Vessel operators who are required to have a Boater Education Card must carry the card on board the vessel and have it available for inspection by an enforcement officer.

Penalty: Not carrying your Boater Education Card

when one is required can result in a fine. Is the Boating Card the same as the Boating License?

The Michigan Boating Safety Certificate is proof that you have successfully completed all of the components of an approved Boating safety course and allows you to go boating. Because the Boating education card or certificate does not expire and does not need to be renewed, it is not called the Michigan Boating License.

Even if not required by law to get the Michigan boating education card, many boaters take the boat safety course in order to save on their PWC or boat insurance.

Speaking of the library, there are many boating how-to books, environmental and science-related books in the library for your use. Remember if you borrow a book, you are on the honor system to return it to the library.

I wanted to take a moment to help members better understand an often misinterpreted dock rule. Section II, Item #8, page 32, refers to the date of July 1st and the impact it will have on your dock status if your boat is not in. I'd like to help clarify that this only applies to a first year dock holder and an "existing dock holder who held, but did not occupy his dock for 30 days during the previous season during the previous year." Please note, the requirement is to have your boat in the dock for 30 days last year. If you are a first year dock holder or weren't in for 30 days last year, it says that you "must pay dock dues" and "have his boat tied to his assigned dock by July 1st", then and only then does the July 1st deadline need to be met before losing your dock is an issue. The paragraph leaves much to be desired and is confusing, but it has been this way for a long time. Perhaps this is something that the members would like to address at a membership meeting? We have long asked for and wanted more participation at the membership meetings and this would be a good way to positively affect the whole of the club by making things simpler and easier to understand. If you have any further questions about this or any of the dock rules, feel free to contact me and we can review them together.

I hope everyone has a good time at Regatta and continues to enjoy the summer!

NOTES FROM THE PORT HURON -MACKINAC RACE

What do you get when you mix a Swan 44' sailboat, 8 guys that haven't raced together, and a 300+ mile race course that takes (2) days to complete? Well that sounds like the 2016 Port Huron to Mackinac Race on which I was fortunate enough to join fellow MBC member and P/C Dave Ryan.

There are (2) courses used to get to Mackinac Island, one is along the Michigan shoreline and the other takes you into the North East corner of Lake Huron to the Canadian shoreline where the mark on the course is listed as Cove Island. Dave and I were racing on the S/V "Nor'easter," a beautiful Swan 44 that comes from Sandusky on the Cove Island Course up into Canada.

From the get-go the weatherman was wrong; he said that we'd have littleto-no wind, and that the start our race could even be delayed. Fortunately for us, that wasn't the case; we had decent wind to start and it continued to build as we worked our way up the lake. To stay alert and limit mistakes, we had 2-man shifts that last for four hours "on" and four hours "off;" shifts are staggered every two hours so there are always fresh bodies on deck. This provides everyone a chance to nap, or at least that's the idea. But when something big needs done, there is an "all hands on deck" call at which point everyone scrambles to get to work.

Meals were pre-made and stored in the ice box so we could heat up dinner or throw breakfast sandwiches in the microwave, or just make a cold cut sandwich when hungry. The drink of choice on the boat, beer, wasn't being served or offered while racing; however we managed to drink nearly 10 gallons of water, the beer could wait for when we made the dock in Mackinac.

The course into Canada was mostly a straight shot to Cove Island; we were fortunate to have the wind behind us and had a nice run straight to the mark. We turned the corner to head west towards Mackinac sometime Saturday morning. I remember because I was supposed to be down for my "off" shift but came up on deck to help with the sail change and to get ready to turn the boat west. Then I went back down to crash out and finish off my nap.

Once we started heading west, we had to make a few decisions as to which "way" was the best method for getting there...do we head out into the lake or do we stick to the Canadian shoreline? Now the wind is somewhat in front of us, so we have to "tack" the boat a lot more to go forward. Tacking is a method of turning the boat left and right in a zig-zag pattern in order to actually go upwind. My favorite saying for this maneuver is "you can't get there from here."

We had a good deal of breeze, some rain and are working our way west when we hear the weather station go berserk warning us to get off the lake, small craft advisory in effect, 40 knot winds and hail predicted, etc. blah blah blah... So forward into the storm we go. As darkness approached we could see the storm cell over the Straights of Mackinac. It looked big and ugly and angry. We prepared the boat for the worst and then continued for it. When it became dark, we had entered the leading edge of the storm and were rewarded with buckets upon buckets of rain falling from the sky, but not so much wind or lightning, as the worst of the storm was to our south and west. The lightning was dazzling; it lit up the entire sky and was awe-inspiring to say the least. One of the coolest things I remember was coming out from underneath the storm, the moon was back lighting the front edge of the clouds and creating a white halo of light around the storm. Well, it was either that or I was delirious from lack of sleep, heheheh.

Maybe someone should ask Dave if he saw it too...



Another neat thing that I hadn't expected was how the wind would change once we got out from underneath the storm. I anticipated it to die off, you know, like the calm that typically comes after the storm. Well, that didn't happen, in fact the wind built even higher than when we were in the thick of it and we saw 35 knots recorded on our instruments. We were flying along and heading for the finish and ended up 8th in our class of (23) boats, not bad, top 1/3 of the group.

We were behind the lead boat by only an hour after racing for (2) days. My GPS logged over 500 miles traversed and what a wonderful time we had. I look forward to doing it again!
