Hello Sailors! We have been gathering information on MBC sail and power fleet weekend cruise destinations this summer and will have it compiled soon and start proposing dates. Meanwhile the racing schedule for this season has been set. There will be Tuesday night races this summer, with early on-line registration available (at noticeofrace.net) as well as in person at the club on Tuesday, May 17, 2022 from 5:00 to 6:00 PM. The first race is scheduled the following Tuesday night May 24, with racing each Tuesday throughout the summer until August 30, except no race on July 5. The fee for the entire season is very reasonable at \$45. The races start a short distance from the channel at the orange "N" racing buoy beginning at 7:00 PM. The boats participating will race in one of two classes, a "JAM" class for boats which are only permitted to use a jib or genoa sail and a main sail, and a "PHRF" class that may utilize spinnakers as well. The JAM classes generally sail a 4.8-mile triangle, while the PHRF class sails an 8 mile triangle course. The results of the race are determined by employing a handicap system, under which production boats are given a rating by a governing body (PHRF-LE) and elapsed times for each boat adjusted according to

About the Invasive carp: Invasive carp are trying hard to enter the Great Lakes system. The Great Lakes commercial, recreational and tribal fisheries alone are valued at more than \$7 billion per year and support more than 75,000 American jobs.

That's why so the many groups are advocating for critical measures to keep them from reaching into the Great Lakes. And why we must urge our representatives in Congress to fully fund a project at the Brandon Road Lock and Dam on the Des Plaines River in Joliet Illinois-- a project that serves as our last, best chance to block carp from the Great Lakes.

"Invasive carp" is a term that describes the bighead, black, silver and grass species of carp, which are distinct from the Eurasian common carp brought to North America in the early 19th century. The fish were thought to be sterile, but were not. They reproduced and, when ponds were flooded, they ended up in the Mississippi River system. Just a few decades later, they made their way to the Chicago Waterway System, a series of dams and locks that connects the Mississippi to Lake Michigan.

Because of their size, appetite and speed at which they can spread, invasive carp have the potential to further disrupt an ecosystem already impacted by established invasive species. The Army Corps of Engineers believes its plans for the Brandon Road Lock and Dams complex can keep the fish from the lakes. The system uses a high-tech, multi-prong approach that includes air bubble curtains, electrical barriers and acoustic fish deterrents.

The estimated price tag is \$778 million, but one that is necessary and sensible given the stakes. The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act will provide partial funding for the project, but there remains a gap of about \$600 million that would need to be cost-shared with the federal government.

There is a bill currently being debated in Congress called the Water Resources Development Act of 2022, which could cover the

remaining costs. Please contact our legislators to urge them to support full federal funding for this project.

The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy... recognized four women on International Women's Day on March 8. I'm summarizing what they do so you can share this with your daughters or granddaughters. Encourage them to study earth science, geology, or various types of engineering.

- Lori Babcock, senior geologist – inspects solid waste disposal facilities like landfills and evaluates their compliance with environmental protection laws. Works with these facilities to develop hydrogeologic monitoring programs.
- Jennifer Bolt, lead and copper rules specialist—helps community water systems comply with the complex requirements associated with lead and copper in drinking water from the Federal and State Safe Drinking Water Acts.
- Nicole Sanabria, geologist, Hazardous Waste Program – oversees environmental cleanup activities at hazardous waste sites ensures that businesses are following Michigan's laws for properly treating, storing or disposing hazardous waste.
- Lisa Thomas, engineer – interfaces with state agencies and private sectors to research, analyze, develop and manage projects/programs that support the Michigan Energy Services, federal Department of Energy, and State Energy Program.

Speaking of careers for young women, be aware of the program offered by MBC-A and NOAA called Weather+Atmosphere=Sailing to be offered to 10th grade girls from the Monroe County high schools, including Monroe High School next fall. Applications for the two-day program will be accepted beginning in June. Watch for announcements in the Harbor Light as well as in the various high schools.

Bugs... Recently, a report was released in the *Journal of Biological Conservation* reviewing the worldwide decline in insects. The authors predicted the extinction of 40 percent of the world's insect species in the coming decades if serious changes were not made when it comes to industrialized agriculture, climate change, habitat destruction and urbanization. Readers began to imagine a world without butterflies and bees.

Equally concerning was the prognosis for aquatic insects. The authors concluded that at least 33 percent of aquatic insects were threatened, with highly sensitive and habitat specific species such as damselflies, mayflies, caddisflies and stoneflies directly in for trouble. They found the homes of aquatic insects are being infiltrated by pesticides they can't outswim. We all know how much we love the

mayflies on our boats and cars, but they serve as food for the fish we love to catch.

Neonicotinoids were developed in the 1990s and quickly became the most widely used group of insecticides in the world; and their prevalence is only growing. They are lethal to many insects, not just pests, and have other broad-reaching and unintended effects. Most often they are associated with the decline in pollinators and birds. They work by targeting the nervous system and while most mammals and many vertebrates are not sensitive to them, invertebrates—like the ones our lake fish eat—are. Mayflies, caddisflies and stoneflies are the most sensitive to neonicotinoids, and recent findings are showing the chemical popping up everywhere, from streams, lakes to groundwater.

For aquatic insects, particularly important fish foods like most mayflies, caddisflies and stoneflies, just the presence of neonics in

the parts-per-billion range are lethal, Research suggests many farmers don't even know they are using seeds treated with neonicotinoids. Neonicotinoids are not limited to the fields of corn and soy. They are everywhere from the flea collar you put on your dog to the over-the-counter spray you use in your flower garden, to the plants you buy for your landscaping. Even plants labeled as "bee friendly" are often known to contain lethal doses of insecticides. In May, the United States Geological Survey released a report noting, "Synthetic chemicals, including pesticides and other organic pollutants, are one of the largest threats to healthy freshwater ecosystems from both an aquatic life and human health perspective."

By virtue of your club membership, all Members, Auxiliary, and their significant others are Associates of the charitable organization. MBC-A funds, organizes and administers educational programs that have non-member, local schools and community involvement.

We are back up to full speed with a lot going on!

2022 Scheduled Events:

- May 12th- "Meet the Pro Fisherman Night"** for all MBC and area kids and parents. Michigan Walleye Tour professional fishermen put on a fun and informative seminar the Thursday before their tournament at MBC.
- May 24th-25th - Environmental Career Day (ECD) for 7th Graders** – Now in its 11th year! Participation includes 2 groups of 50-60 students at MBC one day and Monroe County Community College one day. The program focuses on: 1) the effects of aquatic and land invasive species and 2) the types of careers involved with the environment. The program is co-sponsored by MBC Association, River Raisin Institute and MCCC. We will be needing MBC Boaters to take kids out in their boats each day.
- July 10-13th – Fund Raiser** –Poker Afternoons at Northville MI American Legion (new location).
- July 23rd – 16th Annual Kids Fishing Derby at Regatta (ages 5-13)** –Always on the Saturday morning of Regatta. This year it will be held at Hoffman Park in collaboration with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.
- Sept 20th-21st** - Weather, Atmosphere and Sailing Is a brand-new 2-day event now being finalized in collaboration with NOAA and the North Cape Sailing School. The program focuses on weather observation, prediction and ramifications of climate change, and on the careers in related areas including broadcasting, forecasting and data analysis jobs. Participation is open to all 10th grade girls in Monroe County high schools by application.
- Sept–June - Fishing Club for 5–6th Graders** – Currently meeting two times per month. Started in 2019 and resumed this past January the theme for the club is "Hooked on Fishing, Not on Drugs." Meetings are held in the MBC banquet room on 2nd & 4th Mondays each month until renovations of the west house are complete.
- Sept 28th - Maritime Trades Career Day for 10-12th Graders** – Participation primarily includes students enrolled in trades courses at Monroe High School, and is limited to

30 students for one day. Local tours include various sites including Port of Monroe, Trout's Yacht Basin and Service, Toledo Beach Marina, NOAA, and Solomon Diving underwater welding company.

- Oct 20th-23st – Fund Raiser** –Poker Nights at Vision Lanes Westland, MI.

How are all these programs paid for??

'Poker Nights' Fund The Programs:

The club's 501c3 arm was created to provide educational programs outside of the club's normal budget, relieving the club of those expenses. Due to its structure with the IRS, it is able to receive grant money that the boat club would not qualify for. In addition, the MBC Association is licensed by the Michigan Gaming Control Board to manage poker events that are held in certain bowling alleys and and veteran's posts.

This enables Monroe Boat Club to provide a positive impact to our community and enjoy the recognition that brings, without any expense to the club. All of the funding comes from other people and non-club sources.

Poker nights have been an important part of the budget. Don Blouin has worked very hard to schedule the dates, locations and volunteers to staff the events, and it has been very successful.

Revenues to date:

- 2018: \$6,054.00
- 2019: \$6,265.00
- 2020: \$1,948.00
- 2021: \$ 178.00
- 2022: \$7,092.00
- Total: \$21,537.00

This revenue can only be used for things directly related to the stated mission of the 501c3. It has been used to pay meeting space rent to MBC and purchase equipment that is used for meetings and presentations. The 501c3 pays MBC for using club facilities for every single meeting and program.

Yard Master Update

Springtime is approaching quickly, and right along with the nicer weather comes boat prep! For storage customer's convenience, MBC is providing two methods for disposal of materials:

- 1) You may recycle your plastic shrink wrap by using a special recycling bag available at MBC for \$5.00 and the State of Michigan will recycle the material. Note: Only Shrink-wrap can go in the bag, no string, fiberglass strapping, zippers, spacers or vents. Please use this service and reduce the amount of plastic in our waterways and landfills. See the flyer in this newsletter for additional info. MBC-A is funding the \$2 per bag discount.
- 2) MBC will provide an open-top dumpster for boat coverings and related items only. No household trash or hazardous materials. Will be on-site from April 15-May 16.

Storage rate fees have been adjusted. Trailers with 2 and 3 axles will pay an additional \$10.00/axle, and boat storage has gone up by \$1.00 for members and \$2 for non-members. **DO NOT** use the old storage agreements. New copies are in the clubhouse and on the MBC Website in the *Members* section.
